### Greater Madison Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) November 1, 2023 DRAFT Meeting Minutes

### Virtual Meeting hosted via Zoom

Opitz called the meeting to order at 6:31 PM.

### 1. Roll Call and Introductions

### 2. Approval of October 4, 2023 Meeting Minutes

Williams moved, Caravello seconded, to approve the October 4, 2023 meeting minutes. Motion carried.

### 3. Communications

### 4. Public Comment (for items not on MPO Agenda)

None.

### 5. MPO 2023 Resolution No. 11 Approving Amendment to the 2023 Work Program

Andros explained that an amendment to the 2023 Work Program is required in order to carry remaining 2023 funding forward into 2024. This remaining 2023 funding, estimated at \$91,570, is due to Bill Schaefer's retirement, consultant cost savings due to completing the EV Infrastructure Plan in house, and changes to the timeline for the 2<sup>nd</sup> round of Safe Streets and Roads for All funding applications.

Williams moved, Duncan seconded, to approve MPO 2023 Resolution No. 11 Approving Amendment to the 2023 MPO Unified Planning Work Program. Motion carried.

### 6. MPO 2023 Resolution No. 12 Approving 2024 Unified Planning Work Program

Andros explained that no comments were received on the draft 2024 Unified Planning Work Program and that only a few minor changes are being proposed. These include some of the carryover funding being changed from Roadway and Transit work element (2700) to Long Range Multimodal Transportation work element (2200) for transportation planning activities including updating the MPO's adjusted urban area and planning area boundaries and adding in a reference about using Streetlight Data to generate VMT estimates for the City of Madison and rest of the MPO area.

Duncan moved, Williams seconded, to approve MPO 2023 Resolution No. 12 Approving 2024 Unified Planning Work Program. Motion carried.

## 7. MPO 2023 Resolution No. 13 Adopting the 2023 MPO Title VI Non-Discrimination Program and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan (Title VI Plan)

Lyman noted that no comments were received on the draft plan, which was released for public comment last month. He asked that the three Board members that had not yet completed their self-identification forms to do so, noting that he needs all of the forms returned in order to complete a table in the plan. He explained that the only other changes consist of adding or updating Chinese translations such as the contact information if translation services are required, and adding the Spanish, Hmong, and Chinese Vital Documents.

Williams moved, Callin seconded, to approve MPO 2023 Resolution No. 13 Adopting the 2023 MPO Title VI Non-Discrimination Program and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan (Title VI Plan). Motion carried.

## 8. MPO 2023 Resolution No. 14 Authorizing the City of Madison to Enter into an Agreement with Dane County for MPO to Provide Specialized Transportation Coordination Services in 2024

Andros explained that this resolution will allow MPO continue to provide staff assistance to Dane County for specialized transportation planning and coordination services as provided in previous years.

Duncan moved, Myadze seconded, to approve MPO 2023 Resolution No. 14 Authorizing the City of Madison to Enter into an Agreement with Dane County for MPO to Provide Specialized Transportation Coordination Services in 2024. Motion carried.

# 9. MPO 2023 Resolution No. 15 Authorizing the City of Madison to Enter into an Agreement with the Capital Area Regional Planning Commission (CARPC) for MPO to Provide Transportation Planning Work Activities to CARPC in 2024

Andros explained that this resolution would allow the MPO to continue the MPO's relationship with CARPC, in which CARPC receives funding from WisDOT and passes it on to the MPO in return for the MPO's assistance in completing transportation planning work on CARPC projects.

Williams moved, Andrae seconded, to approve MPO 2023 Resolution No. 15 Authorizing the City of Madison to Enter into an Agreement with the Capital Area Regional Planning Commission (CARPC) for MPO to Provide Transportation Planning Work Activities to CARPC in 2024. Motion carried.

# 10. Brief Presentation and Update on Regional Safety Action Plan and Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Discussion

Hoesly described the SS4A grant program and noted that the MPO has used its own planning funds to hire a consultant to assist in preparing a regional safety action plan. When complete, the safety action plan will enable communities in the area to apply for SS4A implementation grant funding and will also be used in other planning activities exclusive of the SS4A grant program.

Hoesly then described the components of the plan, the timeline, key findings, and grant program guidelines and project eligibility. She noted that the application period is opening up earlier than expected, which will make it very difficult to get implementation grant applications prepared in time but that it may be more feasible to submit applications for supplemental funding. She noted that, even if we do not submit an application in 2024, the program is set to continue for at least 2 more years.

Andros added that it does not appear that an implementation grant application submitted in the 2024 cycle would be successful at this point, particularly given the shorter than expected timeline. She also

noted that the MPO will not have funding for the required local match for a regional supplemental grant application. MPO communities would need to each approve funding that could be combined to provide the required local match for any regional grant application prior to submittal.

Field said the City of Madison budget was in the process of being finalized but that amendments could still be added and said he would coordinate with MPO and City staff to discuss whether the City should include funding for a local match in the budget.

Hoesly said the City's Vision Zero plan qualified as a safety action plan under the SS4A program and that the City had applied for grants in the first two rounds of funding and is still waiting on a decision about their second round application. She also clarified that the regional safety action plan would enable all communities in the MPO area to apply for SS4A implementation and supplemental grants.

Callin said communities may be able to receive funding for planning projects they have already identified but that have been on the back burner through the supplemental program. She also noted that MPOs are often involved in Safe Routes to School activities and that some school districts in other places have worked with MPOs to provide local match funding.

Harrington-McKinney agreed with Field on the need to have a conversation with the City's Vision Zero team about the SS4A grant opportunities.

Wood said his sense was that there is support for looking into whether submitting an application in 2024 would be feasible.

Hoesly said it is unclear at this point when the application period will close, and that there would be more information to share at the Board's next meeting.

### 11. Status Report on Capital Area RPC Activities

Andros noted that CARPC is currently interviewing for a new director and is working on hiring an environmental engineer, and will be hosting a workshop on solar energy on November 30.

She reminded the Board that the next MPO-CARPC webinar, on housing affordability and transportation, will take place at noon on November 16.

### MPO 2023 Resolution No. 16

### Amendment No. 1 to the 2024-2028 Transportation Improvement Program for the Madison Metropolitan Area & Dane County

**WHEREAS**, the Greater Madison MPO (Metropolitan Planning Organization) approved the 2024-2028 Transportation Improvement Program for the Madison Metropolitan Area & Dane County on October 4, 2023; and

**WHEREAS,** the Madison Metropolitan Planning Area transportation projects and certain transportation planning activities to be undertaken using Federal funding in 2024–2027 must be included in the effective TIP; and

WHEREAS, an amendment is needed to add three projects to be awarded federal section 5310 supplemental American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) funding for employee payroll expenses incurred during the Coronavirus pandemic; and

**WHEREAS**, the TIP amendment will not affect the timing of any other programmed projects in the TIP and the TIP remains financially constrained as shown in the attached revised TIP financial table (Table B-2); and

**WHEREAS**, the MPO's public participation procedures for minor TIP amendments such as this have been followed, including listing the projects on the MPO policy board meeting agenda; and

### Re: Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) I-39/90/94 Corridor Study update

### Staff Comments on Item:

WisDOT staff will provide an update on the I-39/90/94 corridor study.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) are conducting the I-39/90/94 Corridor Study between US 12/18 in Madison and US 12/WIS 16 in Wisconsin Dells. The study corridor is about 67 miles long and travels through Dane, Columbia, Sauk and Juneau counties.

The purpose of the I-39/90/94 Corridor Study is to address existing and future traffic demands, safety issues, aging and outdated infrastructure.

WisDOT has identified project needs and developed a range of alternatives, including two new interchanges in the Madison Area, to be included in the environmental impact statement (EIS). WisDOT staff will provide a study update, including a presentation on the draft preferred alternative.

### Re: Regional Safety Plan Goal Setting Discussion and Planned Next Steps

### Staff Comments on Item:

One of the required components of a Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) eligible safety action plan is "an official public commitment (e.g., resolution, policy, ordinance, etc.) by a high-ranking official and/or governing body (e.g., Mayor, City Council, Tribal Council, MPO Policy Board, etc.) to an eventual goal of zero roadway fatalities and serious injuries. The commitment must include a goal and timeline for eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries achieved through one, or both, of the following:

- (1) the target date for achieving zero roadway fatalities and serious injuries, OR
- (2) an ambitious percentage reduction of roadway fatalities and serious injuries by a specific date with an eventual goal of eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries."

According to the Vision Zero Network: "While the goal of zero roadway fatalities and severe injuries among all road users is a bold and sometimes-daunting goal, setting that goal publicly is important to making real change. A bold goal demands bold action."

The study team developed three potential safety goal scenarios for the Board to consider, or the Board can develop their own target. The three safety goal scenarios are:

- 1. Goal Focused on getting to Zero
  - "Reduce all traffic deaths and severe injuries on streets within the MPO to zero by 2040."
- 2. Goal Focused on a percent reduction
  - "Reduce serious injuries and fatalities by 50% by 2035."
- 3. Goal Focused on aligning with the Wisconsin Strategic Highway Safety Plan (2023-2027)
  - "5% reduction of traffic deaths and severe injuries on streets within the MPO by 2027."

**Update on Phase 2 of the Regional Safety Action Plan** (Development of an Implementation and/or Supplemental Planning grant application for Round 3 of the SS4A program).

At the last Board meeting, staff updated the Board that it was announced that the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the third round of funding through the SS4A program was moved up two months earlier than what the study schedule had assumed, and MPO staff were not certain whether that would give them enough time to complete the plan and secure community support and local match commitment in time. Staff provided the same update to the Technical Coordinating Committee at their last meeting, and the only feedback received was that communities agreed it would be a very tight timeline to secure that local commitment. There are two potential options if we don't move forward with an application for Round 3:

- 1. We could pause work on the development of the grant application and extend the consultant contract into 2025 and apply for Round 4 funding; or
- 2. The consultant grant team can help prioritize and develop a strategy for applying for future rounds of funding through the program, and provide support for building and securing local agency buy-in and local match commitment

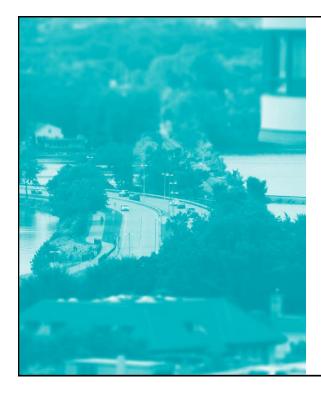

### Staff Recommendation/Rationale:

**Goal Setting**: Setting a visionary zero roadway fatalities and serious injury goal that spans multiple jurisdictions will require the strong support of regional leadership to achieve. The three potential safety goal scenarios presented range from highly ambitious (Scenario 1- Zero by 2040) to "business as usual" (Scenario 3- 5% reduction of traffic deaths and severe injuries on streets within the MPO by 2027). Staff recommends either goal Scenario 1 or 2, but ultimately the selection of a Vision Zero safety goal needs to be driven and championed by the Policy Board.

**Phase 2 of the Regional Safety Action Plan**: Staff recommends not submitting a regional SS4A application for the third round of funding, but to continue to work with the consultant to develop a strategy for being ready to apply for a future round of SS4A funding (option 2 described above). This would include documentation that could directly feed in to a future application, as well as help local agencies build support and commitment for the program.

How Do We Get To Zero Roadway Deaths?

Leadership Commitment and Goal Setting

### Plan must include:

An official public commitment by a governing body (MPO Policy Board) to an eventual goal of zero roadway fatalities and serious injuries.

The commitment must include a goal and timeline for eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries achieved through one, or both, of the following:

- (1)the target date for achieving zero roadway fatalities and serious injuries, OR
- (2)an ambitious percentage reduction of roadway fatalities and serious injuries by a specific date with an eventual goal of eliminating roadway fatalities and serious injuries.



### "Vision Zero" is not a slogan, not a tagline, not even just a program. It is a fundamentally different way to approach traffic safety.

Communities that want to succeed at Vision Zero need to acknowledge that <u>business as usual is not enough</u> and that systemic changes are needed to make meaningful progress.

### Existing Wisconsin Goals

- City of Madison Vision Zero
  - Reduce all traffic deaths and severe injuries on city streets to zero by 2035
- Wisconsin Strategic Highway Safety Plan (2023–2027)

#### By 2027,

- 5% reduction in number of fatalities (2% reduction each year)
- 5% reduction in the rate of fatalities per 100 million VMT (2% reduction each year)
- 5% reduction in number of serious injuries (2% reduction each year)
- 5% reduction in the rate of serious injuries per 100 million VMT (2% reduction each year)
- 5% reduction in number of non-motorized fatalities and non-motorized serious injuries (2% reduction each year).
- Wisconsin has also committed to zero traffic deaths and has adopted the Safe Systems Approach for the SHSP 2023-2027.



### Other Existing MPO Goals

•Indianapolis MPO - On August 17, 2022 the IMPO Transportation Policy Committee adopted a <u>Vision Zero</u> Policy committing to reduce serious and fatal crashes by 35% by 2040.

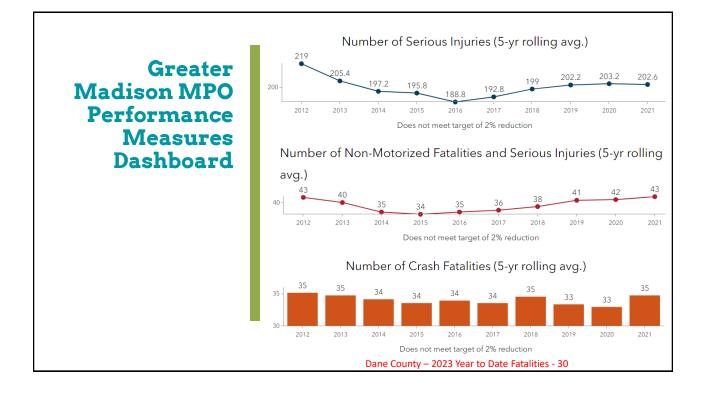
•Oregon Metro (Portland area) – The region is employing a Vision Zero Safe System approach with an adopted goal to eliminate deaths and severe injuries for all users of the transportation system by 2035.

•San Francisco Bay Area Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC)- The policy establishes a region-wide policy to encourage and support actions towards eliminating traffic fatalities and serious injuries by the year 2030.

#### •Denver Regional Council of Governments -

Developed <u>Taking Action on Regional Vision Zero</u>, a safety action plan establishing a target for zero fatalities or serious injuries in the region's transportation system
